As we draw to a close of our Lenten and Easter journey and look towards Pentecost and the gift of the holy spirit to the church it is good to remind ourselves that we are people of the resurrection we are an Easter people. John Paul 11 visited Australia in 1986 and shared these words:

"We do not pretend that life is all beauty. We are aware of darkness and sin, of poverty and pain. But we know Jesus has conquered sin and passed through his own pain to the glory of the Resurrection. And we live in the light of his Paschal Mystery – the mystery of his Death and Resurrection.

"We are an Easter People and Alleluia is our song!"

It is believed that pope John Paul may well have been quoting church father Augustine not directly but very much the meaning of his Exposition on Psalm 148.

But what does it mean for us to be an Easter people. People who live in the shadow or perhaps more correctly the light of the resurrection? Following lectionary scripture readings in the weeks to come we are told through the gospels that Jesus will appear to many people. Those who believe in him will come to understand that he has conquered death. Jesus will tell them that he's leaving again but will send the Advocate, the Holy Spirit.

Mothers Day

So those who love and follow him live in tension still; of course, they want him to stay, forever. What will happen when the Holy Spirit comes? They do not yet know the day it will happen. All they can do is stay together and pray and hope that Jesus' leaving will not be soon.

Much like the disciples living in tension as they awaited the gifting of Holy Spirit we too live in tension. The greatest stories currently about Easter is will people successfully get over the Cook Strait to see loved ones this Easter or what is the best flavour of Hot Cross buns. (For your information I don't believe the existence of Chocolate Hot Cross buns are heretical). The tension that we live in though is that we are still living in the in-between space of the resurrection and the full expression of the coming kingdom of God. And that kingdom in most parts of the western world seems to be getting weaker as the days go on. Personally, we struggle with the tension as well. Our lives and the lives of those we love continue and we and other people suffer, and the answers we want don't come, and Jesus the one who promises to be Emmanuel God with us is hard to find or seemingly absent from our plight.

Those of us who follow Jesus have to stick together. We need to pray and worship together, remind one another of the reality we call the Christian life. It makes sense only if we take Jesus at his word—if we believe that his life merges with ours and that we are forever transformed.

And in the absence of Jesus who walked this earth centuries ago, what do we do? We allow him to live through our bodies and voices, our thoughts and dreams, our arms and faces. We are the Body of Christ. This is not merely a nice metaphor; it speaks a reality by which we live as Easter people. Jesus now is with us, within us. He is also outside us, in others—we meet him especially in those who need our love, those we can feed, clothe, visit, heal, forgive, and love.

Barbara Brown Taylor writes:

"May the news of Christ's risenness touch the dead spots in your heart and bring them back to life, so that you become part of the good news that flows forth from this place today. May you be springs of living water in all the dry places on this sweet, parched earth. May the fresh life that God has given you spill over to freshen all the lives that touch yours — in your homes, in your work, in your schools, and in your cities. May you be Easter people."

Easter is transcendent. Jesus is not somewhere else. Christ is everywhere through him all creation holds together. He lives and breathes through his body, the Church.

So, what does it mean to live as Easter people? It means we live as a people, all parts of Christ's Body working together toward a single purpose: **love**.

Resurrection and Restoration

The Easter message of death and resurrection is powerful on so many levels. Much is made in our contemporary Christian culture of the individual impact of this on our lives but there is also a powerful

collective community impact of this off our lives but there is also a powerful collective community impact that can be easily overlooked. I was struck by this when I was in the Hawke's Bay to preach at a combined service held in the wake of the devastation of Cyclone Gabrielle. The lectionary text for the day was Ezekiel's Valley of Dry Bones, a vision received while he languished in exile in Babylon lamenting the destruction of Jerusalem. As I worked with the text it came to life for me as a message about the resurrection and restoration of ravaged communities.

In my research, I came across the comment that the passage is 'a quintessential vision of human disaster'. And then the Sunday Star Times newspaper on the morning of the service stated that the 'cyclone caused a horticultural apocalypse in the Hawke's Bay', Ezekiel's vision in real time!

The Lord asks Ezekiel if the dry bones can live again, and he correctly throws it back on the Lord! To Ezekiel the scale of the devastation looked beyond human intervention. Some in the storm ravaged regions of the North Island express similar human hopelessness. The same newspaper article reports that, 'Federated Farmer says some families will call it quits after generations of working the land. This Cyclone may prove to be the last straw for some farmers'.

A beautiful thing about Ezekiel's vision is the way the Lord uses human agency to speak and breathe the bones back to life. As I listen to the stories of our Christian communities reaching out to their neighbours in places like Hawke's Bay, Gisborne and Wairoa, I see the same thing happening – God inspired hope-filled human agency, or should I say 'angel-cy', at work helping to bring communities back to life.

In the Hawke's Bay, the Art Deco restoration of Napier following the devastating 1931 earthquake stands today as a beacon of hope, just as does the eventual return of the faithful remnant of the Jewish people to Jerusalem in 538BC!

And I have watched community resurrection and restoration here in my home of Ōtautahi Christchurch in the wake of the devastation of our earthquakes. First, it was the springing up of street art, then the rehousing of the displaced, and then rebuilding of the CBD ... increasing signs of hope and resurrection everywhere I look.

We Jesus people are Easter people. We are resurrection people, carrying with us a message of hope to the most devastated of our communities, cities, and circumstances.
