It is also a time of turmoil for the planet earth with global warming, weather at the extreme end of the scale, and the war that has terrorised the people of Ukraine.

Many families in New Zealand have loved ones in other countries, whom they have not seen in person for some time. The expectation for reunions is slowly being realised and commercial enterprises are holding onto hope that this will rescue their businesses.

How can we cope as Christians? Praying to God is something that is from you and you alone. Even in a group the act of praying can only come from each individual; being present in the moment. There are many times in the bible that illustrate this. It is a personal journey with God.

Jesus showed his love of his heavenly father through prayer.

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Jesus knew that the sequence of the events leading up to his ultimate sacrifice would be overwhelming for his human body. He had been sharing, with his disciples, the sequence of events that would unfold over his last few days on earth. All that had been predicted in the Old Testament

would come true.

At the **Last Supper** in the Upper Room Jesus said. (*Luke 22: 15-16*) *"I have* been very eager to eat this Passover meal with you before my suffering begins. For I tell you now that I won't eat this meal again until its meaning is fulfilled in the Kingdom of God."

As a mother, **MARY** must have been full of deep sadness and grief when her son Jesus was arrested, charged, beaten and crucified. She must have felt overwhelmed and bereft. There are many paintings of Mary and her

companions at the grave site of Jesus and finding the tomb empty, apart from the burial clothes. Had someone taken him away before they could prepare him? Maybe it was a robber, after some treasure? Then there was the Angel saying, "He is not here, he has risen!"



Jesus does reappear to his followers on the way to Emmaus. They do not recognise him but he says. "Peace be with you." That is something that we share during our services in our Parish.

"The resurrection story can enter into our own lives if we live with a "Resurrection mindset", says the Rev Ray Coster in his Study entitled "Reviving the Flame written for The Presbyterian Church Aotearoa New Zealand General Assembly 2012. There can be 3 resurrection mindsets.

1. A pre-cross mind-set – unaware or unsure of what the work of Jesus has done for us.

2. A crucifixion mind-set – not moving from the cross because of on-going feelings of guilt and shame.

3. A resurrection mind set – living in the joy and freedom of the Kingdom now.

A number of years ago I attended a counselling school in England. In discussing relationships one lecturer made this comment:

I am not who I think I am

I am not who you think I am

I am who I think you think I am.



Think about someone special to you and your relationship with them. Insert your name and their name in the above statement. Then focus on your feelings. Now do the same with God in the equation.

I am not who I think I am I am not who God thinks I am I am who I think God thinks I am.

Many of us have grown up with the view that God is very stern and out to judge us. Some think that God is more concerned about our sin, than our salvation."

If I am living in the resurrection of Jesus, should I not sing about my worthiness rather than my worthlessness?"

"i. Congregational Song (from Presbyterian of Aotearoa New Zealand website)

Song is a response which engages the whole self in prayer. Song unites the faithful in common prayer wherever they gather for worship whether in church, home, or other special place. The covenant people have always used the gift of song to offer prayer. Psalms were created to be sung by the faithful as their response to God. In addition to psalms the Church in the New Testament sang hymns and spiritual songs. Through the ages and from varied cultures, the Church has developed additional musical forms for congregational praver. Congregations are encouraged to use these diverse musical forms for prayer."




HOT CROSS BUNS

Sent in by Val of Papakura

2 tbsp granulated yeast 1 cup tepid water 6 tbsp fruit (sultanas peel etc..) ¹/₂ tsp ground nutmeg 1 tsp salt

2tbsp sugar 2 tbsp melted butter 1 tsp ground cinnamon 1 cup tepid milk 5 cups flour



In a large bowl dissolve yeast, sugar and liquids together. Leave 10 minutes and mix together flour, spices and salt. Add melted butter and fruit to liquid fruit mix. Then add dry ingredients and mix together well. Leave in a warm place to double in size.

Turn dough onto floured board. Kneed well, by taking sides into middle, and gently pressing. When nice and smooth break off golf ball sized pieces and roll before placing on greased trays. Leave room for rising and when twice original size press back of knife into buns to make crosses.

Can be glazed by brushing with honey melted with milk.

Place in a pre-heated oven 450°F and bake for 10 to 15 minutes. Makes 20 – 24 buns

Happy Mother's Day !

Early Christians celebrated a Mother's Day of sorts during the festival on the fourth Sunday of Lent in honour of the Virgin Mary, the Mother of Christ. In England the holiday was expanded to include all mothers. It was then called Mothering Sunday.

The more recent history of Mothers Day dates back to 1600s in England. Here a Mothering Sunday was celebrated annually on the fourth Sunday of Lent (the 40 day period leading up to Easter) to honour mothers. After a prayer service in church to honour Virgin Mary, children brought aifts and flowers to pay tribute to their own mothers.

On the occasion, servants, apprentices and other employees staying away from their homes were encouraged by their employers to visit their mothers and honour them. Traditionally children brought with them gifts and a special fruit cake or fruit-filled pastry called a Simnel. Yugoslavs and people in other nations have observed similar days.

Custom of celebrating Mothering Sunday died out almost completely by the 19th century. However, the day came to be celebrated again after World War II, when American servicemen brought back the custom and commercial enterprises used it as an occasion for sales.
